as a gofer, plane washer and waxer just to earn instruction time. One very clean 7AC Champ was worth one hour of dual instruction. It was a very slow process, but I did solo during my 16th summer.

At the age of 18 I had my private license. Then it was off to college. After two grueling years, I spotted a flyer on the bulletin board in the Student Union building that said "Be a Naval Aviation Cadet and wear the Navy Wings of Gold". That's all it took. Off to Sand Point NAS for some tests and a physical and I was on my way to Pensacola, Florida. Boy, did I get my eyes opened! If college was difficult, this was sheer madness, hard classes for half the day and unbelievable exercise for the rest of the day. Somehow we did find time to eat, barely, and shine shoes and otherwise learn how to become "An Officer and a Gentleman". I hardly saw an airplane for four months let alone fly in one. However, when the pre-flight phase of training was finished I started on a flying career path that would stay with me for the rest of my life. Highlights: certainly landing on the aircraft carrier and of course that day when the Commander the last training base pinned on the "Wings of Gold" that I had so coveted on my new uniform.

Once arriving at Whidbey Island NAS, my first base, I found we were in the middle of a rather warm "cold war". I was assigned to fly P2V Neptune patrol planes pretty much all over and across the Pacific Ocean. Let me tell you, that is one hell of a lot of water for a rickety old piston powered airplane. I did survive three years however with no mishaps, but I decided to get ahead in the real world I would need to finish college, so back to school I went. It was much easier this time. At school back in Tacoma I was able to get some extra spending money flying corporate planes for the Weyerhaeuser Company. That was such a good experience that when I graduated they asked me if I would continue as a pilot in the Aviation Department full time. No Brainer! Still after five more years of that the future seemed somewhat limited so it was off to the Boeing Company for the absolute best job any aviator could ever wish for. So started a career of thirty years of flying the best planes around the world with some of the finest pilots I have ever had the pleasure to associate with. As a retirement gift in the Spring of 1995, I was chosen as one of four Boeing pilots to fly the brand new, as yet un-certified 777 around the world

on it's first sales tour. What a way to leave. Even with all the good career perks, the thrill of owning and flying the fun planes; Pipers, Cessna's and all various types of light aircraft has never been far from my interest in aviation. Especially joining with other fascinating people with the same interests and aircraft like the folks in PSAAC is a part of the joy of being a pilot. Even though we are retired now, hopefully Elise and I can continue to share in this enjoyment in our golden years.

Air Tour 2011

Spring is coming so it must be time to begin making arrangements for this year's PSAAC Air Tour. Fortunately your Air Tour Committee has been working hard and the itinerary is now firm enough to allow those who intend to participate the opportunity to make overnight accommodation reservations at Lake Chelan; Libby, Mt.; Polson, Mt. and Sandpoint, Id. Here is how the 2011 PSAAC Air Tour route looks.

This is a simple depiction of our stopping points on the tour for lunch and overnights. Clearly the terrain and scenery are going to suggest something other than "direct" routings between stops for most of us. It has been laid out so that no leg should take more than 2 hours in a Cub even with terrain/ scenery routing taken into account. Here is a brief description of the tour plan:

Sunday, July 10 – Lake Chelan
